Inspired by Darwin's Climate Emergency Strategy and its unique history of resilience, the Summit will bring together experts to share practical and actionable strategies for combating climate challenges through placemaking, urban design, and community-driven initiatives.

#### Climate Innovation in Practice

Your front-row seat at Darwin's Climate Emergency response will ensure that you leave the Summit with actionable tools for driving resilience and sustainability in your own cities and communities. You'll explore Darwin's innovative approaches to climate adaptation through walking tours and indepth discussions:

- Cavenagh Street's Green Spine demonstrates how tree canopies, heat-reflective surfaces, and water-sensitive urban design create cooler, more welcoming public spaces.
- Expert panels will reflect on Darwin's lessons from reconstruction efforts after natural disasters and its application to current challenges in our cities.

 The Climate Resilience Masterclass, led by the CSIRO Darwin Living Lab, Charles Darwin University, and Larrakia Nation representatives will show how the integration of Indigenous ecological knowledge with environmental science can develop adaptive, sustainable cities.

#### Darwin as a Climate Resilience Model

The Smart Darwin Strategy presentation reveals how green infrastructure, shaded walkways, a city of smart climate sensors and integrated data, and heat-mitigation initiatives combined with sustainable transport and renewable energy initiatives are woven into urban design.

- A featured panel will discuss how Larrakia ecological knowledge strengthens climate resilience while preserving cultural heritage.
- The sunset Darwin Harbour Cruise provides a unique setting to witness these advancements from a unique vantage point while experiencing first-hand how design and nature coexist in this tropical city.

From the opening Welcome to Country ceremony to the Saltwater Ceremony that inaugurates the Awards, Larrakia elders will share their traditions, storytelling, and deep spiritual connection to the sea and land that has sustained their community for generations.

Working with academics at the University of Notre Dame and representatives of Larrakia Nation, Place Leaders Asia Pacific has crafted the Summit's Indigenous Placemaking sessions to align with the 'Indigenous Perspectives and Place' Place Leaders micro-credential and the Place Leaders 'Indigenous Placemaking Award'. This cultural celebration will inspire you to consider how honouring Indigenous heritage can enhance urban spaces in your city.
- You'll join guided tours with Larrakia representatives, highlighting the interconnection between the Larrakia people and their environment, offering you a deep understanding of how cultural identity can shape and strengthens placemaking.

Our collaboration with Larrakia Nation exemplifies the Summit's commitment to reimagining urban leadership through diverse perspectives. This collaboration transforms the Summit into more than a conference - it will be a shared journey of learning, connection, and inspiration grounded in the values of the Larrakia people and their enduring relationship with Country.




## Join Us for Amazing Street Art and Night-Time Economy

Did you know that the Darwin Street Art Festival, held annually since 2017, has transformed Darwin into what is now arguably Australia's most vibrant outdoor gallery?

To fully appreciate these artworks, you'll enjoy a walking tour of the Darwin CBD's 130 street murals along with insights into the artists and their creations. You'll use the augmented reality **Darwin Street Art Festival app** to bring the murals to life (**preview**)! This is your opportunity to witness first-hand how public spaces can be transformed into canvases that tell diverse stories.

You'll also experience a vibrant Night-Time Culture and Economy Tour to see how creativity and sustainability come alive after dark. See how Darwin's night-time economy has been revitalised through smart lighting, street art, and strategic activation of underutilised spaces, and experience exclusive Cultural activities on the lawn in front of the historic Country Women's Association building in the CBD.




